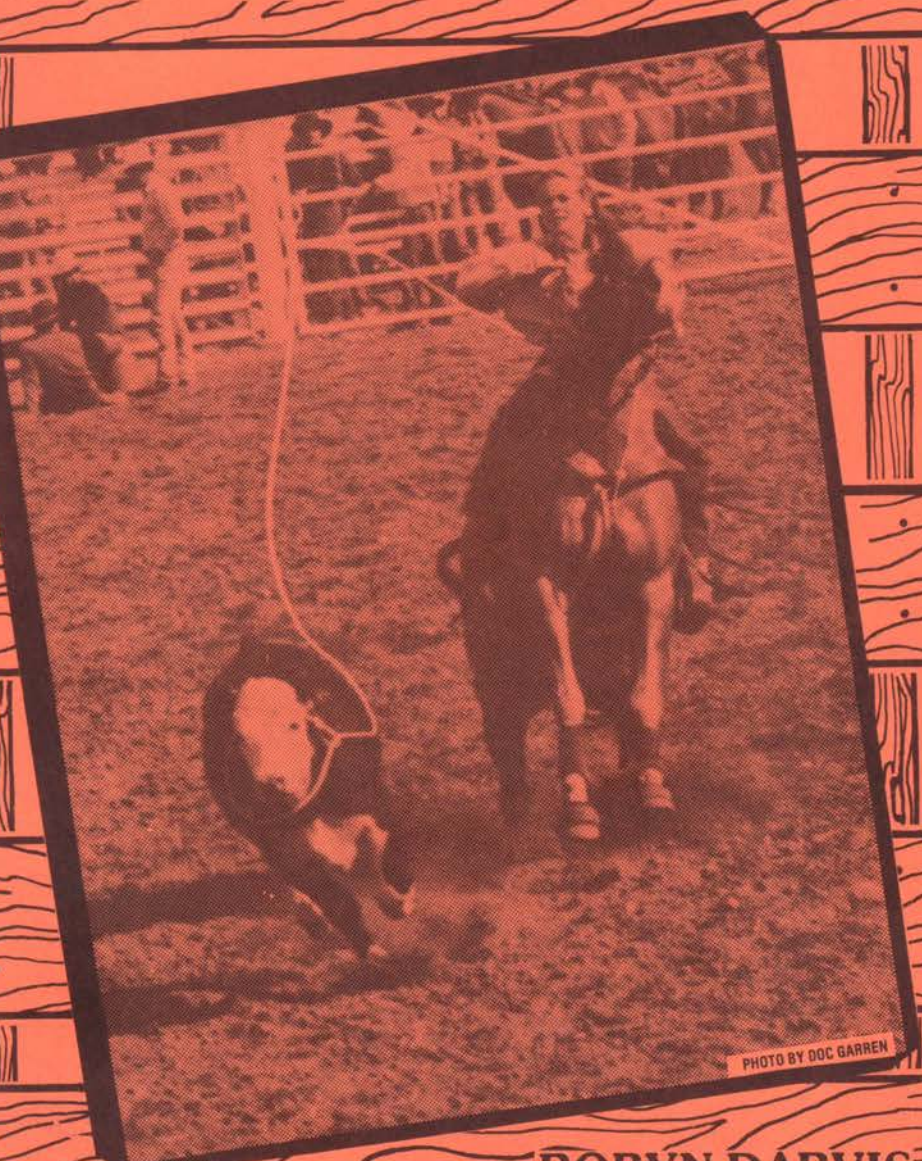

Dear Tootie and Stan,

Or should I say DAMN, Tootie and Stan, I thought you knew better. WHAT A SLAP IN THE FACE. If what you were looking for is a response to your editorial, here it is!

A bit of history on why the barrel racers started dressing flashy and colorful. In the first place, it was not the barrel racer's idea to dress in colorful western attire. The barrel race took the place of the trick riders or various acts and the stock contractor put the money he would have spent on acts in a purse for the barrel race; therefore, the contractor wanted them to be flashy and colorful.

Whenever (and seldom any more) there is a grand entry the barrel racers carry flags, post colors or what ever needs to be done to make it a success.

In the second place, the barrel racer had better have a high powered steed in order to win. As in any other event, the barrel racer pays the same amount of entry fees, judges charges and entry charges. It costs the same or probably more to care for a race horse than other horse. The calf ropers, team ropers and steer wrestlers ride the very best horses they can in order to win.

If there is a "break in the action" to set up the eye, maybe it is because the announcer doesn't have enough imagination or organization to fill a gap for a couple of minutes. The announcer, the committee and the stock contractor all are aware of the fact that the eye must be set up. Can no one plan ahead to use this time in a productive way???

The announcer, the stock contractor, the clown and the judges are all paid to perform regardless of the quality of their performance. These paid

performers should develop a plan to set up the eye and entertain the crowd for a couple of minutes, not the contestants themselves!!!

The announcer could use his imagination during these, "breaks in the action" and promote the barrel racers and their horses. He could explain to the audience what a unique type of race horse the barrel racing horse is. They can be any size, color, sex or breed. No other race horse in the world puts up with the travel and different conditions like a barrel racing horse. It also could be pointed out that it does take a lot of skill to ride and train a good barrel racing horse. Also this NRA Rodeo News reports that the barrel racer has the most money won in any event.

Many of the barrel racers also rope and the All Around Cowgirl usually wins as much or more than the All Around Cowboy. Why are you giving the top competitors such a hard time? (Jealousy perhaps.) If the announcer doesn't have enough imagination to keep the audience filled in on the pretty ladies and fast horses maybe the clown could do an act or tell a joke, he gets paid for his performance. Most rodeos I have been to have many sponsors. These sponsors are probably in the audience and would love to hear the announcer tout their names on how much help they have been in making this rodeo possible.

Electric eyes have been used for a number of years. By now, the announcer, the stock contractor and the committee should know there might be a couple of minutes or a "break in the action" and be prepared for it. I find the "break in the action" for setting up the electric eye no worse than 15 steer wrestlers riding the same steer wrestling horse

and having to change stirrup lengths and horses every run. Or the calf roper who draws a calf that he can not possibly throw down because the calf is bigger than 300 lbs. which the rule book states it cannot be. Sometimes a bronc won't come out of the chute or a bull won't stand. OOPS!!! "Break in action." We are dealing with live entertainment, that's why most people like rodeo.

The barrel race is the fastest event in rodeo. TIME IT YOURSELF. After as many rodeos as you two have been to, you should already know this.

Now for the things that barrel racers do to get their event ready. The barrel racers and the NRA secretary see to it that the electric eye is charged and transported to and from the rodeos. In most cases the barrel racers help mark the barrels and score line. They help put the electric eye lines to the crowd's nest so the timers can read the clock. Really, they help with everything except setting the eye just before they run (and sometimes they do that too!!!)

Does a calf roper, team roper or steer wrestler help put up the barrier? Or better yet does he put the neck rope on the calf or steer just before he competes? Does the bronc rider, bareback rider or bull rider help corral his stock or sort them and put them in the chute? Barrel racers do more for their event than any other contestant.

The barrel racers pay the "unknowing" judge one dollar every run. The judge goes to clinics to learn how to judge other events in order to be on the qualified judges list. The judge should have to learn how to set up the electric eye or not be on the qualified

judges list or not collect a dollar from the barrel racers.

What other event does the contestant have to help set up the event just before they compete or before the rodeo. Barrel racers need to concentrate and prepare to compete just as any other contestant does.

As far as I'm concerned your editorial was very rude, unjustified and unfair.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

AUGUST 18, 1988 — 5:00 P.M. — BILLINGS SHERATON

President Glen Hough called the meeting to order.

Dave Wagner had requested time on the agenda to discuss the concerns of the Broken Horn Stampede Committee with KGHL radio. Discussion.

Roll Call: Those members present included: GLEN HOUGH, JANN JOHNSON, ED WALDHAUSER, NICK ECONOM, TOM HOLLAND, JIM BUSHNELL, WAYNE KELLY, SCOTT SCHALL, BRUCE MARTIN, BILL LYNN, LYLE BAUMANN, BETSY EVANS, STACEY BAUMANN, NANCY PETERSEN, PATTI HOLLAND, DR. HOWARD HOLLOWAY, JAY LINDERMAN FOR JANET ENDECOTT, BOB GRAVELEY, RODGER NORDAHL, ED MILLER, BOB SCHALL, and PROXY BY LOIS HILL. The events not represented, stock contractors. Quorum verified.

The minutes of the March 27, 1988 Board of Directors meeting were distributed. Approved as written. The finances of the Association were discussed and accepted subject to audit.

OLD BUSINESS

The day money rule change in the bull riding event was evaluated and discussed. Seems to be working out well.

NEW BUSINESS

Lois Hill moved that: THE NRA DONATE \$100 TOWARDS THE BUCKLE FOR THE MONTANA BARREL RACERS ASSOCIATION. Ed Miller seconded. Motion passed.

Lois Hill moved that: THE NRA SET UP A RETIREMENT PROGRAM IMMEDIATELY FOR JANN JOHNSON. Tom Holland seconded. PASSED AS AMENDED: Discussion. AMENDMENT: WHEN THE BUDGET COMMITTEE MEETS FOR 1988, IF THERE IS ENOUGH MONEY IN THE BUDGET, POSSIBLY AT THAT TIME AN AMOUNT CAN BE PLACED IN A RETIREMENT ACCOUNT FOR THE PAST YEAR. Rodger Nordahl, seconded. PASSED.

The North American Rodeo Commission was discussed. Team awards will once again be awarded to the Association that accumulates the most points during the World Finals Rodeo in El Paso this Nov. 5-12. Bob Gravely moved: IF THE NRA RECEIVES A TEAM AWARD, THE ASSOCIATION KEEP THE MONEY TO BENEFIT THE ENTIRE ASSOCIATION AND OFFSET THE COST OF THE NARC DUES OF \$2250. Lyle Baumann, seconded. PASSED. The current information regarding the World Finals Rodeo was reviewed.

The resignation of Tootie and Stan Rasmussen, editors of the NRA News for the past 10 years, effective February 1989, was read. Other newsletter options have been received by the NRA and were presented to the Board. A decision on the new editor and newsletter will be made at the fall meeting.

Lyle Baumann: Some stock contractors have not been supplying the correct number of timed-event cattle for the number of contestants entered in certain rodeos. The contestants had asked Lyle for direction from the Board. Discussion: Possible stock charge being withheld if numbers are not in accordance with the rule book; points not counting at those particular rodeos; not allowing participation in the Finals rodeo. This subject will be discussed at the fall meeting.

The World Classic Rodeo in Ogden, Utah Oct. 23-29 was discussed. This rodeo is produced by the World Professional Rodeo Commission and expected added money will be \$33,000. Each of 16 member Associations will send 5 contestants per the 8 events. Entry fees are \$200 per event with the Association dues being \$500 annually. TOM HOLLAND: THE NRA JOIN THE WORLD PROFESSIONAL RODEO COMMISSION AND SEND A TEAM OF CONTESTANTS TO THE WORLD CLASSIC RODEO IN OGDEN. LYLE BAUMANN SECONDED. PASSED.

The NRA is having problems with Canadian checks clearing the Canadian banks and re-collecting from the cowboys. IT WAS MOVED AND SECONDED THAT THE NRA NO LONGER ACCEPT CANADIAN CHECKS DRAWN ON CANADIAN BANKS. CASH OR AMERICAN CHECKS ACCEPTED BY THE RODEO SECRETARIES ONLY.

An office problem regarding Tom Bravard was brought to the Board's attention. Nominations for some positions on the Board of Directors are open. Those positions include: President, Vice President, Steer Wrestling, Bull Riding, Team Roping, Junior Events, and Eastern Committee Directors. Any member may make a nomination to the office up until the ballots are printed following the fall meeting.

Jay Linderman brought up the concerns of the Ennis Rodeo Committee. Discussion.

The possibility of allowing permits in the rough stock events at the MontanaFair in 1989 was discussed.

Bill Chiesa stopped in and visited with the Board. He gave an overview of the current MontanaFair.

Judges' seminars were discussed. Rodger and Sheila Nordahl would like to assist with the seminars. Thank you, Rodger and Sheila.

Meeting adjourned.

NARC World Finals Rodeo - El Paso

The 1988 Coors World Finals Rodeo has officially been scheduled to be held in El Paso, Texas at the El Paso County Coliseum, Nov. 5-12, 1988. The first performance will begin on Saturday night, Nov. 5 and the performances will continue through the following Saturday night, Nov. 12.

Contestant Eligibility: When determining eligibility of contestants, an association must utilize contestant standings. Such standings shall be current as of the first of the month prior to the month in which the CWFR is held, or the association's most current year-end standings. Contestants must be chosen in listed order from one of the above for all events. If a contestant chooses not to compete, the next in line shall be given the opportunity to do so. If contestant names do not follow that as shown on the standings, an explanation must be provided.

Added Money: The Adolph Coors Co. will add a total \$31,400 to the prize money for the 1988 Coors World Finals Rodeo. \$2,400 will be allocated for Team Awards and \$29,000 will be split equally among the eight events, double the added in the team roping.

Prize Money and Payoff: With 27 member associations and the returning champion getting a free in, we have the capacity to run 82 in each event. Eighty-two in each event and entry fees of \$200 plus the added money bring the total payoff to \$176,600. A single event will pay \$19,622.22 and the team roping will pay \$39,244.44. Payoff will be conducted on two long go's, the short go and the average. Of the total purse, 25 percent will go into each long go, 10 percent in the short go and 40 percent in the average.

Each long go and the average will pay six places split 29, 24, 19, 15, 9 and 5 percent. This short go will pay four places split, 40, 20, 20, and 10 percent.

Team Awards: The Adolph Coor Co. is offering Team Awards once again for the

best teams at the Finals. The bonus will be paid to the association whose team wins the most money at the rodeo. First place will receive \$1,000; second place, \$700; third place, \$400; and fourth place, \$300.

Only the top three in each event from your association will be considered the team. Fill-ins and alternates do not count for team awards.

Additional Prizes: Hand-made custom trophy saddles donated by Circle Y Saddlery will be award to each event champion and to the All-Around Champions. Hand engraved trophy buckles from Skyline Silversmiths will also be awarded to the champions. Resistol Hats will outfit each champion with a 15X black hat and Tony Lama will award custom made exotic leather boots with the N.A.R.C. logo embroidered in the top of each boot.

Stalls: Stalls for contestant's horses will be available for \$20 per horse for one night or ten nights. All horses will

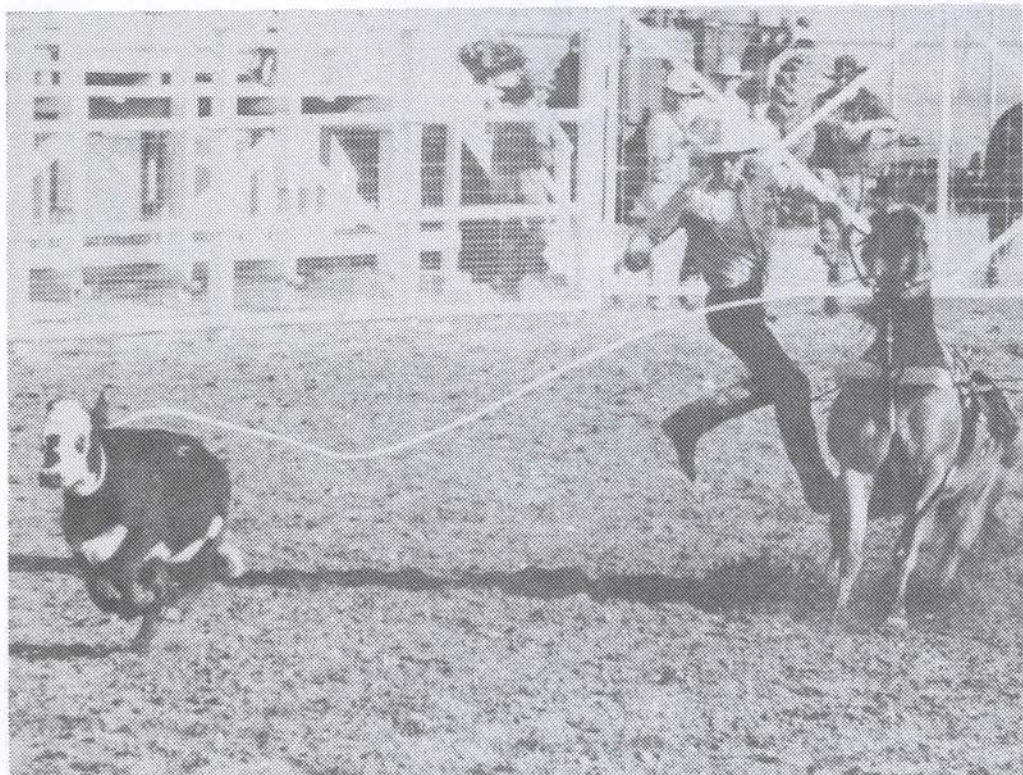
be registered with the rodeo office and issued a leg band which must remain in place for the duration of the rodeo. All horses kept on the coliseum ground must have a leg band.

Headquarters Hotel: The headquarters hotel will be the Rodeway Inn located on I-10 between the airport and the coliseum. The hotel is about five minutes from the coliseum, is right next to Bassett Shopping Center and is fully equipped with a beautiful swimming pool, restaurant and lounge. The hotel will offer free shuttle service to the airport and the coliseum and a schedule will be posted in the hotel lobby. The El Paso Tourist and Convention Bureau will set up an information booth in the hotel lobby with

Solomon to Rejuvenate Rodeo

HAVRE — With 40 years of rodeo experience, no one knows the sport better than Ed Solomon of Havre.

And who better than Solomon could be called on to rejuvenate rodeo at Northern Montana College?

"We never did drop the rodeo program here," Northern athletic director Loren Baker said. "We were at an all-time low. We had lost our recruiting program. We had lost the motivation behind the program because of a lack of leadership."

Consequently, Solomon was recently named rodeo coach and advisor for Northern. "We feel very fortunate to have Ed Solomon as the new rodeo coach," Baker said.

"He's got over 40 years of experience in rodeo. He, himself, has participated in just about every event," Baker continued. "He has got a tremendous reputation around Montana with ranchers and cowboys and people in general associated with rodeo."

Solomon also has six rodeo scholarships to fill by fall, when the Big Sky Collegiate Rodeo circuit begins. Three of the 10 rodeos are conducted in the fall, while seven follow in the spring, including the Northern rodeo in May.

Solomon was on the recruiting trail in Lewistown at the state high school rodeo.

"Most of these kids I'm talking to right now, I've rodeoed with their grandfathers and fathers, all the way down," Solomon said. "You feel like you know the families."

Money generated by the Northern rodeo, as well as other rodeo club fund-raisers, will help support the program and draw more athletes.

"I feel the rodeo team has not really been progressive," Solomon, a Havre native said. "I wanted to start out and try to get it that way as quick as we can."

"Definitely before college starts, we hope to have some

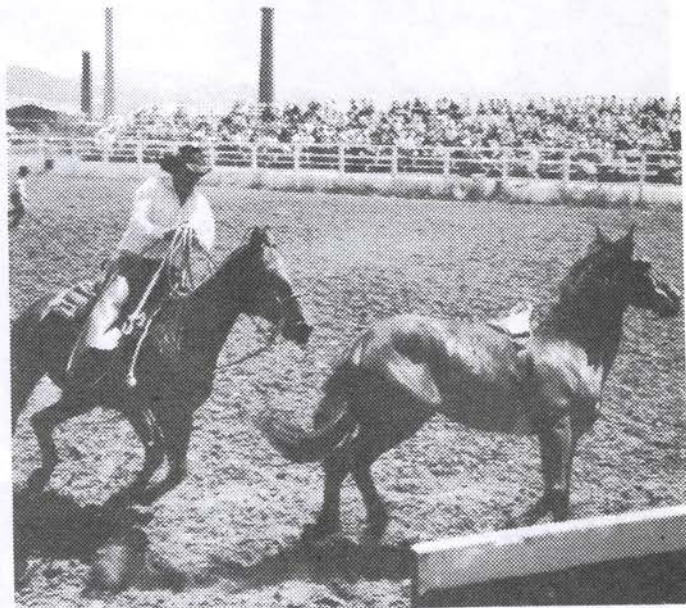
of the better athletes on our team," he added. "I've already made arrangements for lots of practice stock for them."

Potentially, the Northern rodeo team could number between 30 to 50 athletes, Baker said.

"The administration felt we needed to make a commitment to rodeo," Baker said. "The No. 1 goal was to bring in a lot of students to Northern Montana College and to do that we felt the important thing was to build a budget for rodeo."

Not only is the expense of scholarships involved, but also stock must be cared for and fed, plus there is considerable expense with a 10-rodeo schedule.

Some of the fund-raising ideas being considered include a rope-a-thon, slave auctions, jackpot roping and a calf-a-year club. Some of the major corporate rodeo sponsors, such as Copenhagen and Coors, are also being contacted.

NRA Pays Off Half Million

The Northern Rodeo Association cowboys and cowgirls competed for nearly one-half million dollars in prize money during the 1988 rodeo season. Entry numbers were up substantially in the majority of the eight events, some as much as 30 percent. According to NRA President Glen Hough, the regional rodeo Association "had a banner year."

With the 1988 rodeo season completed, Spike Guardipee of Browning has already set a regular season earnings record with \$12,633 won. Guardipee can increase those win-

nings at the Northern Rodeo Finals set for Feb. 4-6, 1989 at the METRAPARK Arena in Billings.

The NRA Finals features the top 10 in each of the eight sanctioned events competing for year-end championships. The closest competition is the Saddle Bronc Riding where \$85 separates the leader Jim Walker, Lovell, Wyo., from third place Victor, Mont., cowboy Kent Robbins. Dan Mortenson of Billings is second in the Bronc Riding and leads the Bull Riding by almost \$900.

MBRA Plans Expansion For Ropers

At the Montana Barrel Race Finals in Deer Lodge, it was decided to expand the organization to include break-away ropers and barrel racers. There would be champions declared in each event plus an all-around. Ideally there would be saddles, buckles and a horse trailer for championships, then top ten awards, but this would depend on enough interest to get them donated. The points for 1989 will start immediately as the MBRA points count from finals to finals.

The following is a brief list of the most important items needed for memberships, approvals and points:

1. A \$30 membership will need to be paid to one of the MBRA officers or mailed to Shelley before the event for your points to count. (Post-marked prior to event is fine.)

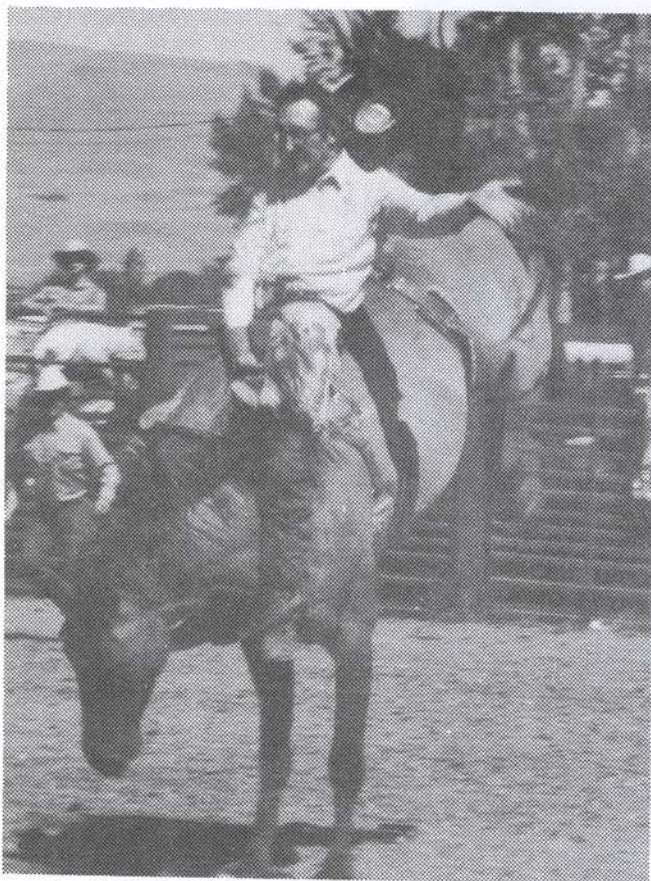
2. For the event to be approved it must have a \$50 minimum added money per performance and a \$10 minimum entry fee.

3. It must be advertised in the Northern Rodeo Ass'n, Women's Pro Rodeo Ass'n or MBRA news at least 2 weeks prior to entry closing.

4. The area for approvals is Montana and surrounding states and provinces.

5. You must turn in your own points within two weeks of the events to the points chairwoman. If you know you placed, but don't know the dollar amount you may request an additional two weeks.

There will be a meeting at the Northern Rodeo Finals in February at METRA in Billings to elect officers and conduct any necessary business, including selecting a 1989 finals site.



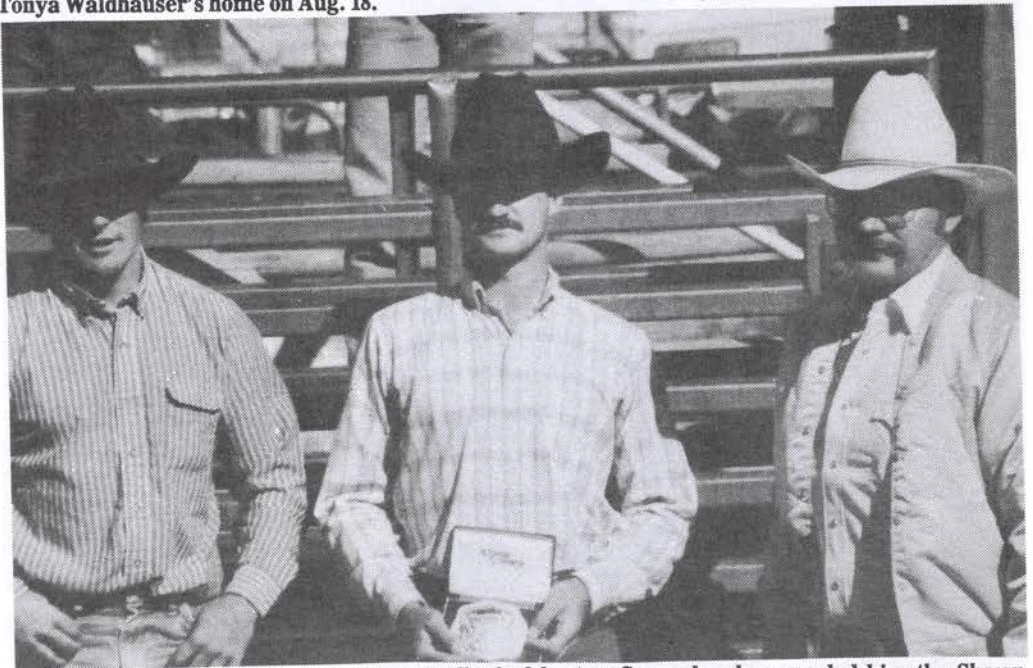

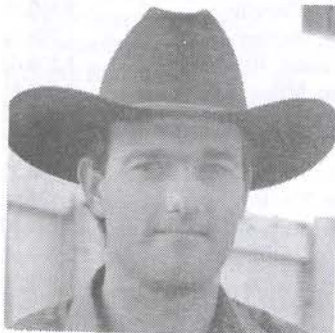

Aussie Enjoys Montana Rodeo

HAVRE — Sweet Sue introduced Greg Gibson to the Northern Rodeo Association fair circuit Friday night at the Hill County Fairgrounds.

The Australian native got the best of the bareback bronc, notching a 66 before local pickup men, Ed Solomon and Jack Solomon, rescued the visitor from the rough mount.

Gibson's score stood fourth overall after the first of three performances at the Hill County Fair Rodeo. However, it would take a 71 or more to reach the pay window. Steve Cutler of Lewistown marked a 75 Saturday evening to pad his standing's lead.

The rodeo, with a record 350 entries, truly was an international event, including several Canadian hands and eight entries from Down Under.

After a two-year stint playing winger (receiver) in an Australian semi-professional football league, Gibson decided to try rodeo. That was in 1983, and by 1985, Gibson reigned as the Australian national bareback champion. He repeated that feat in 1987.

Meanwhile, Gibson currently leads the bareback standings in the Australian Bush-

mans Camp-draft Rodeo Association.

Since his spring arrival in North America, the 26-year-old has established the bareback lead in the Foothills Cowboy Association and sits second in the Canadian Cowboys Association standings. Gibson estimated his combined earnings at \$7,000.

Gibson, along with a pair of saddle bronc riders and a pair of bull riders, have taken up temporary residency in Innisfail, Alberta. He'll return to his hometown of Scone, New South Wales, in time for the ABCRA national finals in early December.

Rodeo in Australia is a 12-month sport, according to

Gibson who competed in 62 rodeos in 1983. "I guess I caught on pretty quick," he said. "I've been rodeoing off and on since I was 12."

"I was bucked off my first horse in two years, two months ago," Gibson added. "Bareback riding is pretty physical."

Gibson grew up around horses. His father raises thoroughbreds and his brother won the 1985 Northern American Rodeo championship in the saddle bronc.

"My brother came over here for a year," Gibson said. "I should have come years ago, like when I could have went to college (on a rodeo scholarship)."

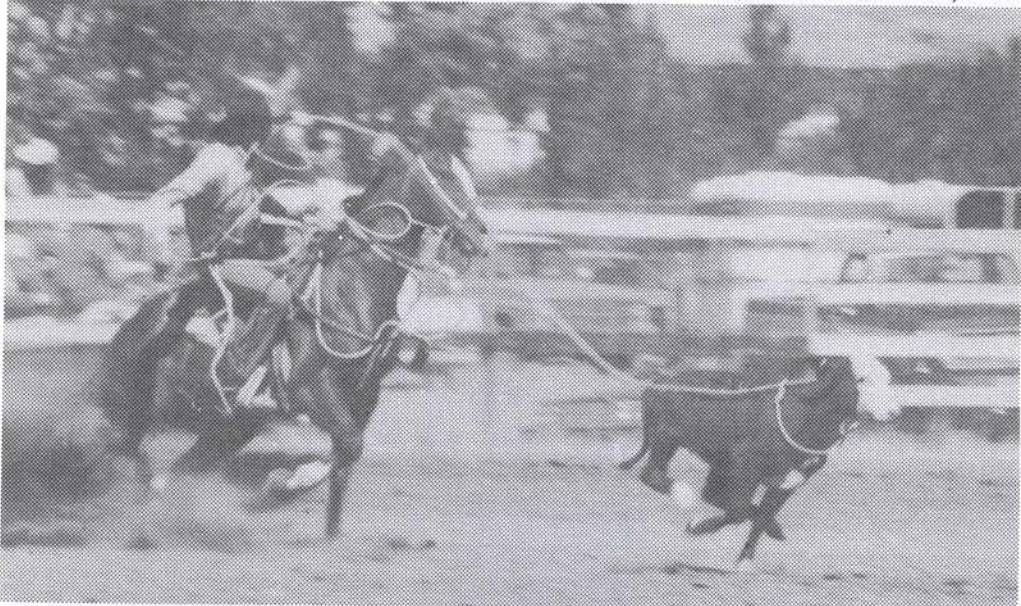

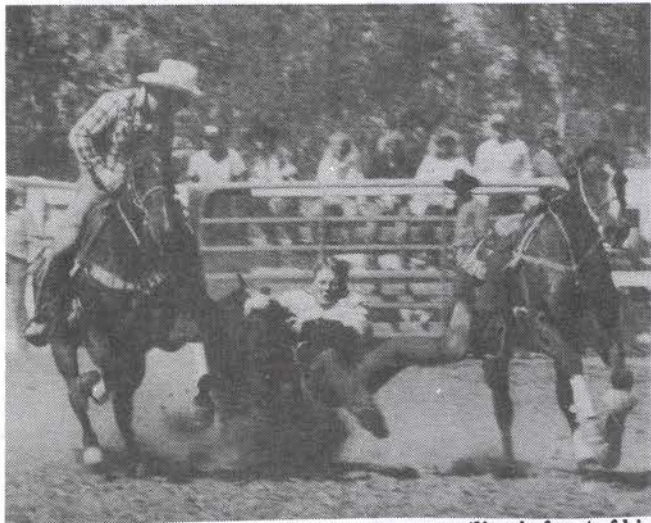
